


Welcome

Dear Colleagues!

We are pleased to announce that the IX. International Congress of Hungarian Studies will take place in Miskolc and Sárospatak between August 24–29, 2026. The congress is organized by the International Association for Hungarian Studies (NMTT), the University of Miskolc, and the University of Tokaj-Hegyalja.

The congress, held every five years, is the largest international forum for Hungarian studies. The two major cities of northern Hungary, Miskolc and Sárospatak, with their rich cultural and historical heritage, provide a worthy venue for the conference.





The main theme of the congress is: *Sources of self-awareness – changing perceptions of Hungarian identity*

Self-awareness enables us to cooperate with others and to situate our own values in space and time. However, self-awareness is inconceivable without understanding others and their opinions – this applies to community as well as individual self-awareness. The cultural, political, and social identity of a national community is solid when it includes the external image formed of it. It can only renew itself continuously if it seeks to harmonize its image of itself with the image others form of it.

At the beginning of the 21st century, in the context of globalization and changing power relations, it is particularly important to continue and examine the historical dialogue

between cultures: to take stock of successes and failures and to map the changing dimensions of the image of Hungarians. Hungarian studies, as an interdisciplinary forum, aims to initiate this dialogue and promote fruitful cooperation between different disciplines.

The focus of the 2026 congress is to reveal new dimensions of Hungarian identity: historical and social contexts as well as cultural, linguistic, and artistic expressions of identity. The topic proposals received confirm that the issues of self-understanding and the image of Hungarians not only provide an opportunity for interdisciplinary cooperation, but also reflect on contemporary social problems.

Practical information

The symposium chairs will invite individual applicants with whom they wish to work, and will also decide on the duration and order of the presentations and discussions. The selection of presentations for symposia will therefore take place continuously alongside registration, and we will send the speakers information about the results.

The opening ceremony will take place at the University of Miskolc in the early afternoon of August 24, 2026, followed by plenary presentations and the general meeting of the International Association for Hungarian Studies. The scientific sessions will take place in Miskolc on August 25–26 and August 28, and in Sárospatak on August 25–26. The joint opening ceremony for the two symposia in Sárospatak will take place on August 25, 2026.

The symposia will be held at the University of Miskolc and the University of Tokaj–Hegyalja. Participants can request accommodation in the university dormitories.

The participation fee for attending the scientific and cultural events and receptions is €150 gross, or €120 gross for fee-paying members of the International Association for Hungarian Studies (or the equivalent amount in HUF). The discounted participation fee for our retired and PhD student presenters is €100 gross.

If the latter are also fee-paying members of the Association, then their registration fee is €70 gross (or the equivalent amount in HUF). This includes the cost of publications containing information on each symposium, as well as the right to participate in cultural events and accompanying programs. The excursions traditionally held on the fourth day of the congress (August 27) are at the participants' own expense. The accompanying participants' fee is uniformly €70 gross (or the equivalent amount in HUF). We will provide information on the deadline and method of payment, as well as the technical details of bank transfers, in our next circular.

Registration is open until March 31, 2026, using the registration form available on the congress website. Information regarding accommodation, meal plans, and excursions, as well as the order form and its online availability, will be sent to registered participants in the second half of April 2026, with a deadline for response by 15 May 2026. We will provide information about the exact dates of the symposia on our website by April 20, 2026, so that you can book your accommodation, meals, and excursions with this information in mind.
